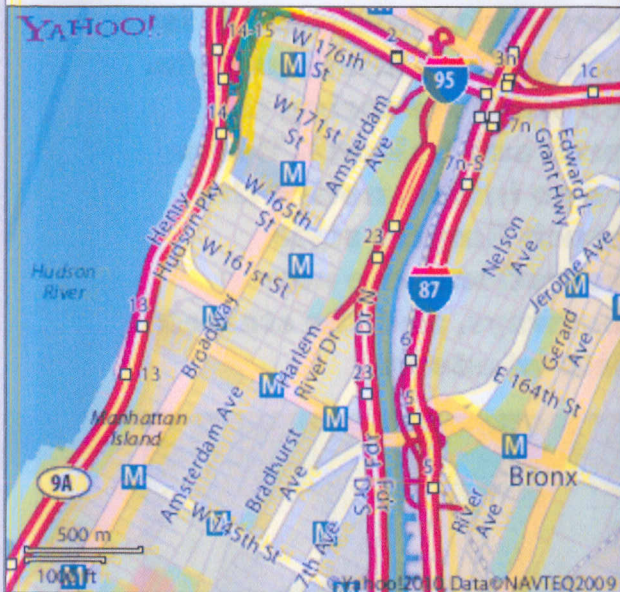


## MAP TO MORRIS JUMEL MANSION

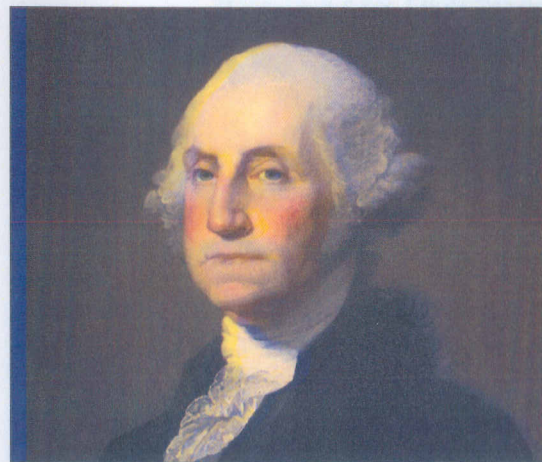

## HISTORY

The Morris Jumel Mansion was built in 1765 and is located at the corner of West 160th Street on Edgewcombe Road. It was built by Roger Morris for a summer home for his wife Mary Philipse and himself. George Washington used the mansion as his headquarters and he and future presidents ate dinner at the mansion! It became an inn then the Jumel's bought it. They decorated it in the French Empire style. They added new doorways and stained glass. It opened in 1904. Come and admire this beautiful mansion!!

## HIGHLIGHTS

This is a beautiful two-story white mansion. It is built in the Palladian style. You will love seeing the porch and balcony. When you go inside, notice the French Empire style decorations, the new doorways, and the stained glass windows.
