Contract submitted for Registration

The construction contract with Sienia Construction for the first phase of the Morris-Jumel Mansion exterior restoration and accessibility project has been submitted to the City for registration. Once the contract is registered with the Comptroller's Office, construction will begin. This process can take several months, during which time we will continue to move the project forward by making plans for collections care, advocating with community and elected officials to continue supporting the project, and spreading the word about this exciting new phase in the museum's history.

In Memoriam: MJM staff member Karen Compton

MJM staff, Board and friends were saddened by the sudden passing of staff member Karen Compton in mid-November. A native New Yorker who grew up on the Upper West Side, Karen worked at the Morris-Jumel Mansion for five years, beginning as a volunteer and moving to staff member in 2022. Karen was most often welcoming guests on Sundays along with colleague Kimberly Eicker.

A rigorous researcher whose passion for history was infectious, Karen relished learning the many histories that are part of the Morris-Jumel Mansion. She was also a dedicated facilitator for Paranormal Investigations and enjoyed sharing stories of her own experiences with otherworldly happenings in the house.

Spotlight on MJM Emergency Procedures



Fire has long been a part of NYC history, including during the recent drought, but we are fortunate that MJM did not add a "fire of 2024" to our own history. On November 19th around 2:30 Public Programs and Visitor Services Manager Danielle Gaita noticed the distinct smell of fire in the Mansion. While all was well there and in the Park, she could see smoke billowing just to the south. Danielle and Administrative Assistant Presley Rodriguez were quick to register the threat to the Mansion, noting helicopters hovering, and numerous sirens wailing. They described it as feeling like a war zone.

Executive Director Catherine Hughes was exiting a conference near Wall Street when Presley called to alert her to the situation. Catherine asked that they use the hose on the back of the Mansion to spray down the east side of the property, to mitigate against potential flying embers. Danielle and Presley jumped into action to keep the Mansion safe while firefighters extinguished the nearby blaze.

The next day a reporter from Bloomberg News arrived at the Mansion inquiring about the effects of the fire on such an important historic building. The article was published online the following day.

(Bloomberg) -- ...As the flames crept closer, the staff of the Morris-Jumel Mansion, just off Harlem River Drive in Washington Heights, began to get worried. The historic estate-turned-museum is the oldest surviving home in Manhattan, built in 1765, and is made of wood.

Someone ran to a shed at the rear of the property to find the hose that had been stashed away for the winter. With the smell of smoke heavy in the air, workers sprayed the outside wall closest to the park where the fire was spreading, hoping a good soaking would prevent stray embers from setting the home ablaze.

The strategy worked. Firefighters eventually got the flames under control, and the home survived unscathed. "They were heroes," Catherine Hughes, the museum's executive director, said of the workers who sprung into action.

The threat of fire was a frightening reminder of the vulnerability of historic wooden buildings and the need for constant vigilance. The staff of MJM, and all of NYC, were grateful for the rain that ended the dangerous drought conditions, while remaining aware of our responsibility for the preservation of this unique structure.



A Paranormal Fundraiser


